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COMMUNITY SERVICE

Every Academy student is required to do community service. The minimum number of volunteer hours outside the home is: FRESH-MAN, SOPHOMORE and JUNIORS must complete 5 hours every 9 week period.

Each student receives a form that must be signed by the recipient of the service. Students must submit the signed forms copies to the guidance counselor and Academy Coordinator.

The Academy defines community service as any task completed outside the home for which the student is not paid. Some organized community service activities will be scheduled throughout the year.

No family member may sign for community service hours. Religious activities are not considered community service.

The Academy Coordinator may determine if the source is acceptable. Some suitable forms of community service are:

Assisting the Academy with co-curricular activities • Helping a neighbor • Assisting the elderly • Assisting a young mother • Helping at school (sports score keeping, working in concession stands) • Volunteering at an agency (Manatee Springs park, a day care facility, a hospital) • Community cleanups • Walk-a-thons like Relay for Life • Other approved activities

Failure to meet the required hours will negatively affect the grade earned in class.

SENIORS are exempt from community service requirement IF they have accumulated 50 hours or more of community service during their 9th, 10th, and 11th grade years. This applies to seniors only and cannot be applied to any other grade level, regardless of the number of hours accumulated. Any volunteer hours collect in 9th and 10th grade will NOT count toward the requirement for the next grade.

The purpose of the Levy County Academy of Health Related Professions is to support and guide each student in preparing for the next major steps in his or her life, including further education, entry into a health related career, and to help each student develop into a compassionate, responsible citizen prepared for the important roles of an adult.

This is accomplished by treating students as capable, responsible, collaborative, lifelong learners, and providing challenging, integrated, authentic, meaningful learning opportunities within and outside the school, and by treating faculty as professionals fully empowered to work with the community and the local school district to make important decisions in the best interests of students.

Program Goals and Objectives

- Students will graduate from high school prepared to enter the workforce in high skill, high wage, high demand health related careers.
 - A. Students will earn an industry certification.
 - B. Students will complete the work based learning and clinical experiences required to meet program and industry certification requirements.
 - C. Students will earn the Florida Ready to Work Credential.
- II. Students will graduate from high school prepared to enter postsecondary programs in health science.
 - A. Students will complete the Academy of Health Related Professions three to four year college-preparatory program of study.
 - B. Students will have the opportunity to complete academic and health science dual enrollment courses.
 - C. Students will have the opportunity to complete <u>credit-by-exam college credits in accordance</u> with the post-secondary articulation agreements for Associate of Science (A.S.) degree programs.
 - D. Students are required to take the ACT in 11th grade, with follow-up remediation provided as needed to ensure that the student is ready for postsecondary training.
- III. Students will meet or exceed Florida high school graduation requirements.
 - A. Students will earn passing scores on the Standardized State exams. B. Students in the Health Academy will exceed CHS attendance reauirements.
 - C. Students will demonstrate academic progress as measured by annual district Progress Monitoring Assessments.

Chiefland High School ACADEMY OF HEALTH RELATED PROFESSIONS

The goal of the Academy of Health Related Professions is to prepare students to enter the workforce in a health related field, and/or to continue their postsecondary education. To succeed in this goal, it is necessary to have expectations and guidelines for students that will instill professionalism, teach good work ethics, and insure that learning takes place in a safe and productive environment. These guidelines and expectations are explained in this handbook.

GENERAL INFORMATION

OVERVIEW

A Health Academy is designed to prepare students for employment and post secondary education in health related careers. It includes integrated and rigorous classroom instruction, lab practice, clinical experience, and shadowing in selected health care settings. All students will take an industry certification exam their Senior year and all students will have the opportunity to earn college credit by taking college exams for credit at the end of their Junior and Senior year. Academy applications are available to ALL students entering ninth and tenth grades. Academy students must complete a three or four-year program of study, including career and technical skills and academic components. All academy students are required to complete a career exit point and participate in patient care/clinical requirements in twelfth grade.

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EXIT PROGRAM PROTOCOL

Students who have successfully completed Medical Skills and Services, Health Science Anatomy and Physiology, and Health Science Foundations will be eligible to enter an exit program in their senior year, including: Emergency Medical Technician, Nursing Assistant, and Allied Health Assisting.

- The student must have successfully completed the above stated core courses with a grade of C or above. Students with a D or F will not be permitted to continue in the Health Academy Program. In addition, the student must be on track to graduate, by having completed and passed the necessary academic course work. (Students must maintain an A average in the Program to be eligible for the Florida Goal Seal Scholarship program.)
- The student must have maintained acceptable attendance by following the rules established by the School Board of Levy County, Chiefland High School, and the Academy of Health Related Professions.
- The student must have maintained acceptable behavioral practices by following rules and regulations established by the School Board of Levy County, Chiefland High School, and the Academy of Health Related Professions.
- 4. The Academy Team must recommend students for admittance into one of the above stated exit programs.
- 5. Students must provide their own transportation to clinicals, on the job training, and post-secondary program events and must complete a Chiefland High School transportation form and show proof of automobile insurance and a valid driver's license.
- 6. Students must be able to provide the required attire for the stated programs.
- 7. Students may be required to provide expendable supplies and materials, as required by the appropriate post-secondary program.
- 8. Students will pay for their industry certification exam but will be reimbursed the cost of the exam fee after the testing date by completing the district reimbursement forms. Students will NOT be reimbursed if they miss their scheduled exam.

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HEALTH EQUIPMENT

Students are not permitted to operate or use medical equipment located in the academy classroom for any purpose other than classroom instruction. This includes, but is not limited to, hospital beds, wheelchairs, mannequins, skeletons, or any other equipment. Students will be subject to discipline and referral for failure to follow this rule.

FAQ's

1.) What is industry certification?

It means that you are licensed by the State of Florida, certifying that you have completed a course of study and passed the state exam to perform a particular job. In the case of the Health Academy, the certifications are Certified Nursing Assistant, Emergency Medical Responder, and Emergency Medical Technician through dual enrollment.

2.) Why is it important?

This is important because this credential will provide a good job in the health field. It will also earn points toward being accepted into competitive college programs like nursing, respiratory therapy, and radiology technician.

3.) What is articulated college credits?

College credits that you can earn towards an Associates of Science (A.S) degree by completing appropriate high school Career and Technical Education course.

4.) How can students earn A.S. Degree College credits?

The student can earn these credits by having an "A" average in their Health Academy courses, making at least a "3.0" overall all GPA for all high school classes, and then passing the college final exam with a "B" or better. The Academy teacher will work directly with the college to arrange for the student to sit for the collect final exam.

CODE OF ETHICS

TEACHERS

A copy of the Florida code of Ethics for Educators will be provided to all teachers. Teachers are expected to accept and follow that code.

STUDENTS

Students enrolled in the Academy of Health Related Professions are expected to conduct themselves in a reasonable and mature manner. Any deviation from appropriate behavior may result in probation or dismissal from the program. Students suspended from school for fighting or stealing will be removed from the Academy. Students with excessive referrals will be removed from the Academy at the end of the school year.

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CURRICULUM

Academic and Health Courses will be integrated. Teachers work as a team so that academic teachers i.e., Math, Language, are teaching skills needed in Health careers, and Health Courses teach academic skills that relate to Health.

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APPLICATION/ADMISSION PROCESS

Students interested in the Health Academy must:

- *Complete an Academy application
- *Submit 3 teacher recommendations
- *Complete the individual interview process

The Academy admissions process will also include a review of the student's academic, attendance, and behavioral records.

Students are encouraged to join Health Occupations Students of America, HOSA, which stresses the recognition and promotion of the worth and dignity of each member, and the development of leadership skills. Participation in HOSA helps to foster integrity, enthusiasm, and devotion to a career in health occupations.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

ATTENDANCE / ABSENCES

Students are required to be in class every day of the grading period. If a student is absent, he or she must make up missed assignments. Teachers will follow guidelines of the Levy County School Board System for make-up work. The Academy team will review students with excessive unexcused absences and determine if the students should be removed from the Academy.

Each teacher will submit an absentee record to the office daily during first period. Teachers will report excessive absenteeism and tardies to the truancy officer. Students who have six absences per nine weeks may be placed on probation. If the problem continues during the time of probation, the student may be asked to leave the Academy.

The principal must approve any planned vacations by students that involve extended absences from school. Parents are asked to notify the Academy Coordinator of planned extended absences. Students need to complete all assignments prior to any extended absence, or make appropriate arrangements with teachers. Students should NOT miss clinical hours due to the coordination of effort between the school and local health care facilities.

All students who arrive at school late are considered tardy and will check in with the attendance office for an admittance slip. The Tardiness infractions will be handled according to school policy. Students who check out must get their assignments for the missed classes. The Academy team will review students who check out of school excessively.

GRADING PROCEDURES

Grading procedures will be implemented according to School Board of Levy County policies. The grading scale is as follows:

- A 90-100
- D 60-69
- B 80-89
- F 0-59
- C 70-79

All grades will be rounded to the nearest whole number. Grades in excess of 100 are limited to Advanced Placement, Honors, or Dual Enrollment courses specifically designated for such a grade.

DRESS CODE

The Academy of Health Related Professions will abide by the policy that has been adopted by the School Board of Levy County. The policy is made pursuant to Florida Statute 230.23 (6).

In the Academy, students are expected to dress in a professional, tasteful manner. Because of our professional ties to the health industry, the school authorities will prohibit any type of make-up, hairstyle, and hair color, or garment that detracts from the proper business and academic atmosphere during clinical work., shadowing, or field trips.

SPECIFIC ACADEMY GUIDELINES

All seniors attending clinicals will wear scrub uniforms, including a scrub top and scrub pants and white or black closed toe shoes. Hairstyles must be off the collar. Ponytails are acceptable as long as the hair does not fall in front of the shoulder when the head is bent forward. During clinicals, students will not wear necklaces, bracelets, hoop, or dangling earrings, or rings. Body piercing that is visible is prohibited. Nursing Assistant students will need a wristwatch with a second hand, and a black ink pen.

FIELD TRIPS

Most field trip destinations are hospitals or laboratories, and college campuses. Safety standards require closed toed shoes. Students will wear their scrub tops and scrub pants on field trips. Students dressed in unacceptable attire for a field trip will remain at school. Blue jeans are expressly forbidden.

SCIENCE LABS

On lab days, closed toed shoes, long pants, and shirts with sleeves are required.
